Originally, 灯籠流し or 'Floating Lanterns' in Japan is a ceremony in which paper lanterns are released down a river or into the ocean, often performed on the last evening of the 'Obon' season, when it is believed that the spirits of ancestors return to the living world. The lanterns symbolize the lives of those who have passed and return them to their nature.

Lanterns are set afloat at dusk and the scene is a play of light and dark as the lantern glow slowly fades into the distance. Decorate your lanterns with your own message of wishes and players. Enjoy the event.
